**LITERATURE REVIEW**

Existing research indicates that transgender students face systemic exclusion and limited support in educational environment :

- A 2022 study by the Centre for Law and Policy Research highlighted the lack of welcoming and inclusive environments in both schools and higher education institutions.
- A report by Drishti IAS noted that although some Indian states have taken steps toward inclusion, there is still no nationwide gender-sensitive curriculum.
- A UNESCO (2018) report on “International Technical Guidance on Sexuality Education” emphasized that Indian curricula rarely address issues of gender identity and sexual diversity, contributing to the invisibilization of transgender students in classrooms.
- Research by Narrain & Chandrasekharan (2020) observed that transgender and gender non-conforming

students often encounter bullying, harassment, and administrative hurdles in higher education, including difficulties in name and gender marker changes.

- The National Human Rights Commission of India (2017) highlighted how the absence of gender-neutral facilities and a lack of sensitization among teachers and administrators create barriers for transgender students to access education equitably.

- A study published in the \*Indian Journal of Gender Studies\* (2019) found that transgender students experience disproportionately higher dropout rates compared to cisgender peers, largely because of discriminatory practices and stigma within schools.

- A policy brief by the YP Foundation (2021) noted that while the \*Transgender Persons (Protection of Rights) Act, 2019\* mandates non-discrimination in education, the implementation gap remains wide, and institutional practices often do not reflect legal protections.

These studies show the urgent need for reforms in curricula, teacher training, and institutional practices to ensure that transgender students are supported.
