The story revolves around a mystic who recounts eerie and supernatural occurrences tied to old mansion and abandoned houses. These setting often remnants of Colonial rule, are depicted as spaces that hold dark secret S and hidden histories. The atmosphere of decay and abandonment in these mansions serves to amplify the sense of dread and unease, reflecting the psychological impact of Colonialism and the Unresolved trauma it has left behind.
